TERM 4 FAITH MEETS LIFE (2)

Expected Outcomes

- consider common areas of difficulty and how Christian faith might help them deal with those issues
- discover different expressions of faith in contemporary music
- know how to interpret Christmas from a Christian perspective
- explore a Christian response to negative emotions
- examine Bible teaching about how a person can grow from their mistakes

This term-long unit looks at 7 different issues in life and explores how faith intersects with those issues. Faith can build resilience by bringing a different perspective, inner strength, and skills to help when life is tough. Through clips of Christians sharing their journey, experience of Christian music, and examining biblical perspectives, students will encounter attitudes and points of view that can broaden their thinking and give them tools to do better in everyday life.
